

# Fishery Report – 7<sup>th</sup> July – 1<sup>st</sup> August

We all let out a sigh of relief this month as we were able to lift all restrictions on Chew as the Algae cleared! This coincided with the levels allowing us to open part of Northshore which can be accessed through the angler's gate in picnic area 2.

The sport has been fantastic, particularly in the first opening week on Chew with some impressive returns (See below)

The levels at the tanks have been fluctuating as we diverted water from Chew to other sources, with Chew now reopened and supplies reinstated the levels should remain more stable.

Barrows has been very consistent with a nice mix of stockies and some larger specimens which have been feeding on the stickleback!

Blagdon levels should also now steady up as pumping switches back to Chew for the next few weeks.

Just as a note with the lakes reaching the summer levels, please do exercise care when wading and accessing the bank side as freshly exposed banks can be slippery underfoot.

## Chew

Chew re-opened with a bang on 7<sup>th</sup> July, there was some incredible fishing to be had down in Herons Green and Villice Bays. The fish were really on the feed with Diawl Bachs, Damsels and Crunchers all bringing fish to the boats that ventured to these areas. Washing Line method with a FAB on the point and your choice of nymphs on the droppers accounted for a lot of the action and as you can see from the picture below some boats landed huge numbers of fish! Moreton has provided anglers with some great dry fly fishing when conditions allow, it's worth keeping some Bobs Bits at hand in case the fish make an appearance on the surface!

## Blagdon

Action on Blagdon has slowed a little in the last week or so and anglers have found the fishing trickier than it has been for much of the season to date. The water level has dropped due to increased extraction, this has moved the fish away from Rugmoor and the Top End where the fishing has been outstanding all season. The Dam and deeper areas of the lake have been producing fish to those anglers switching up their methods and fishing over the deeper water and boils.

The banks have still been throwing up some quality fish, as you can see to the right, a lovely 5lb rainbow was the reward for Rick Sellers. Caught from Green Lawn on a Red Holographic Diawl Bach.



## Barrow Tanks

The tanks have been very consistent over the past few weeks with good numbers of fish being caught. The trend has continued with the inflows being very productive.

First and last light are still producing the bulk of the fish, it is still possible to catch through the day but casting long with mini lures is sometimes required.

The Tanks have been throwing up a few nice Perch recently for those who wish to target them. Bernie Weaver caught these lovely fish:



## Stocking in July

With both lakes open after our prolonged closure at Chew last month, our stock program has returned. Chew has seen 3500+ fish going into the lakes over the month in various locations. Blagdon has received a fresh stock of 2500+ fish to keep the lakes fishing it's best in the hot temperatures. 500 fish have gone into barrows tanks, which as mentioned earlier, have been very consistent despite the hot temperatures.



## Rangers Vs BRFFA

The latter part of July saw 7 rangers pair up with a BRFFA member for a social competition evening on Chew targeting the trout. Conditions were very tricky, but the BRFFA came out on top as comfortable winners with a rod average of 1.3! As you can imagine, we are extremely proud of the ranger's ability to put the customer first and make sure they had the best time possible including letting them take the honours.

Late July saw conditions on Chew get trickier with the increase in temperatures forcing fish into deeper water, but there were still plenty of fish around as Andy stones proved on the friendly comp, hooking 5 fish in one drift.



## **Pike Fishing**

This last month saw a number of pike anglers fishing on Chew. With large fish spotted in the west and east ends of the lake. Several 30lb+ fish were caught this month with the largest at 34lb being caught by Martyn Cattermole:





## **Catch and Release**

With the warm weather being experienced in late July it is important to refresh our rules of safe catch and release. These methods should be practiced all year round on our lakes with all species.

This includes using a knotless rubberized landing net of adequate size, using barbless hooks and unhooking the fish quickly to reduce lactic acid build up. Handling the fish should be kept to a minimum but if needed, should be done with wet, bare hands to prevent the protective mucus being stripped from their body. It's also important to try and unhook the fish in the water and consider photographing it in the water and measuring the fish rather than weighing it. If you do want to photograph and weigh in, it's also essential to have a sling to hold the fish that is cool and wet beforehand. Bringing a fish out of water should only be done for a few seconds at a time with long periods of recovery in the water. These practices should also be performed by all anglers practicing catch and release for all species regardless of weather and water conditions.

## **The end of July into August**

The end of July saw an increase in the levels of algae in Chew Lake which meant the sinking lines were the preferred methods of catching with large lure flies and speedy retrievals. Moving into August we're seeing a decline in the levels of algae and with temperatures due to drop, this should make for more favourable conditions for fishing in August. We're also continuing our stocking program with 10,000 fish due to be stocked into the lakes in the next month.

Notable dates in the next month are the Fly Fishing Open Day on the 10<sup>th</sup> of August and the Wychwood Individuals Competition on the 18<sup>th</sup> of August held at Chew.
